All Church Bake Sale


Our Holiday Bake Sale (coordinated by the Ladies Aide Society) is right around the corner and will take place on Saturday, November 21st from 10 AM to noon.

Dear Friends in Christ,

As of this writing, our church's plans to mark Thanksgiving are a little bit up in the air. We are waiting to hear back from some of the other churches in town since we are not sure whether they would like to collaborate on a modified Community Thanksgiving Service. Whether other churches are available to work with us or not, we will do something here in Somersville to show our thanks to God for our many blessings.

Christian Education (submitted by Lani Bortfoeld & Pastor Graham)


The church school finished up our unit on the patriarchs/matriarchs in Genesis on October 18. During this unit we learned that families in the Bible had problems like jealousy, playing favorites, and selfishness, but that God was able to work with his imperfect people to bring about good. We had a memory verse from Deuteronomy which we read every week, and learned about different ways to ask God to help us.

We have now begun the unit "Journey to Freedom", which is stories from the book of Exodus, with Moses, Aaron, Miriam and Pharaoh as the main characters. The children and youth are reading all of these Bible stories

from the new Shine Bible story book, *All of Us*; they are enjoying the graphic novel-style illustrations and acting out the stories using the Bible story which is especially formatted for this purpose. Each family who registers their children for church school this year will receive a free copy of this updated Bible resource.

Below is the sequence of stories for November. In addition to the *All of Us* book, we are using the maps, family trees, crafts, activities, music, magazines, Bible posters and other supplements to reach children with a variety of learning styles. This month's Bible memory poster comes from Psalm 63 v.1-4; CEV:

You are my God. I worship you. In my heart, I long for you, as I would long for a stream in a scorching desert. I have seen your power and your glory in the place of worship. Your love means more than life to me, and I praise you. As long as I live, I will pray to you.



Since it's very important that we plan out our space needs for social distancing, we ask that families please let us know when you're going to be absent or bring a guest. For the next few weeks, we will either use the CE classrooms or be on Zoom. Lani will send an email Saturday evening to let you know what which format we'll use. When having Sunday school at church we will have fresh air moving through the classroom, so please dress warmly. Also, for ALL CHURCH MEMBERS: PLEASE DO NOT DROP OFF ANY ITEMS IN THE CE CLASSROOMS without asking a member of the CE Board first. We need to keep these rooms clear in order to have enough space to socially distance with the children & youth.

When we are in Zoom sessions, they take place after the worship service has concluded – typically around 11:15. It is important to have a variety of faces/voices in the session. You do not have to host the session, just present the lesson; Lani or Graham will take care of the Zoom details. Currently, Marj and Lani are the only teachers, so we really would appreciate any kind of help. Just let us know when you can help reading the Bible story or lead a craft. You can sign onto Zoom from your home and read or lead the activity from there - we'll be glad to do a practice session with you!

The CE Board continues to check in with families by phone after each CE meeting to update you on upcoming events and catch up with your family's joys and concerns. Each family has a CE contact person; please let

us know suggestions, questions, concerns or prayer requests. Your Board of CE wants to hear from and pray for you in these challenging times. In this way, we hope that we can stay connected in Christ through these tumultuous times.

Thank you, and may we all learn from the Bible, through prayer and from one another as we transition to the winter months,

Missions (submitted by Pastor Graham)

2nd Mile Missions

Our Missions Outreach Board has identified two mission partners for the month of November. For the first, the Cornerstone Foundation in Rockville, CT, we will collect money. Collection envelopes will be available in the pews or you may mail a check to the church. For our second mission partner, the Enfield Warming Center, we will collect supplies. You are asked to contribute to one or both, according to your abilities.

The Cornerstone Foundation has served the poor of Rockville for nearly four decades. This ecumenical ministry runs three small homeless shelters, a soup kitchen, a youth center (presently closed because of COVID), a clothing bank, and a food cupboard. Our financial donations will help them keep people safe, fed, sheltered, and clothed.



The Enfield Warming Center is our other mission partner this month. In other years, the Enfield Warming Center has provided warm space for Enfield's unhoused to sleep overnight during the cold winter months. This year, due to the coronavirus, they will be offering an "engagement and outreach center" at St. Patrick's Church on Pearl Street in Thompsonville. While they will not have the facilities to provide overnight accommodations, they will provide pre-packaged snacks, winter gloves and hats, warm socks, and Enfield Magic Carpet bus passes. Their goal at the engagement and outreach center is to connect their clients with social services and non-profits who can provide more lasting aid. Please look in Wood Chapel for the collection box for prepackaged snacks, winter gloves and hats, warm socks, and Enfield Magic Carpet bus passes. You are invited to add the requested items to the collection box anytime during the month.

Recall that Jesus taught, "Whatever you have done to the least of these, my brothers and sisters, you have done to me" (Matthew 25:40.) Please give generously to our second mile mission partners this month.

Church Without Walls

CWW is an ecumenical ministry with the homeless held each Sunday at Court Square in Springfield. This outdoor service (held in any weather) begins at noon and concludes about 30-40 minutes later with a free lunch to

any who would like to partake. Our Board of Missions, with your support, provides lunch (sandwich, snack, and fruit) on the 4th Sunday of each month when Pastor Graham leads the service.



Food Share

Members of our church help distribute food every other Wednesday from 1-1:30 in the parking lot of the Somers Congregational Church. If you are willing to assist, speak with Marge Morgan. November dates are the 11th and 25th.

KIVA (submitted by Linda Longueuil)

During September, we were able to make 2 loans bringing our total loans to 169. The first loan went to Luis Antonio from El Salvador. He will use his loan to purchase fertilizers and herbicides for his crop of beans. The second loan went to Kadijatu, a refugee from Sierra Leone who lives in Arizona. She will use her loan to overcome the challenges in her business posed by the Covid-19 crisis. Their stories can be found in the KIVA notebook.



One loan was repaid in full during September. Peekapak used their loan to reach young children learn to cope and thrive after being victims of violence or bullying.

Annual Turkey Supper

Our final fundraising supper for 2020 will be here before we know it – Saturday, November 14. We'll be cooking up about 350 lbs. of turkey breast, 100 lbs. winter squash, stuffing, potatoes, and so much more. This is a big meal that requires a lot of time and work so please check out the sign-up sheet outside the office to see how you can assist or contribute. The following (as of 10/28) are some of our needs:

- 8 pints grape tomatoes
- 11 homemade pumpkin pies (in addition to making 20 here at church)
- 8 large bags of gravy mix
- (54 small or 27 double boxes) stuffing mix
- 10 lb. butter
- monetary donations to buy potatoes (\$60), cranberry sauce (\$55), gravy mix (\$25), etc. or put toward the cost of turkeys
- physical assistance on Friday, Nov. 6, beginning 8:30 AM to prepare the squash and Friday, Nov. 13 to prepare the potatoes.
- 2 or 3 people to slice and pack up bread and dessert
- 1 more person to help bag meals



While it's not included on the sign-up sheet, we could also use help boning and slicing the turkeys once they're cooked so please speak with me as to when this will be done if you're willing to lend a hand.

Cost is \$12 per meal that will be curbside pick up between 4:30-6:30. My swan song goal for my final supper (as coordinator) is 300 orders! Menu consists of turkey, stuffing, mashed potato w/gravy, winter squash, cranberry sauce, tossed salad, rolls/breads, pumpkin pie. Call or email the church office to reserve.

Pot Roast Recap

We put up 270 meals and there could have been more, but I finally capped it ~ not like we had any more room to cook anything else and we kept blowing electrical circuits. Nineteen roasters were used and placed all around the kitchen, social room, and even the classrooms. I had increased the amount of meat and vegetables and we still had barely enough meat, came up short on

the potatoes and had to get some carrots from the freezer! There was a steady line of traffic (backed up to Rte. 190 – I'm told). It was a profitable meal; \$3,308.00 was deposited before expenses were paid (\$515.00).



There were many who contributed essential ingredients and labor to make this meal come together, and I thank all of you.

These suppers take a lot of time and effort and I, as supper coordinator, have appreciated your continued support and participation. Thanks to all of you who have given so much to make these fundraisers successful.

Ask US officials to oppose ‘unprovoked surprise attack’ on Armenian enclave, UCC urges **October 12, 2020**

Leaders of the United Church of Christ and several of its ecumenical partners are calling on their members and congregations to contact elected officials about a deadly ethnic conflict in Southwestern Asia and to pray for victims of the violence.

The church bodies are calling on the United States to “undertake diplomatic measures to halt the fighting” in Nagorno-Karabakh, an Armenian enclave within Azerbaijan.

Global Ministries of the UCC and Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) has joined the National Council of Churches and the World Council of Churches in opposing what the NCC described as an “unprovoked surprise attack by Azerbaijan that has brought Armenia into a state of war.”

The violence in Nagorno-Karabakh, also known as Artsakh, started Sept. 27 with air and ground attacks by Azerbaijan and its allies. “We deplore the use of military force by Azerbaijan and the Syrian rebel fighters that are funded and sent by Turkey to assist their assault on the Armenian community,” said the NCC statement, now also posted at the Global Ministries website. “The use of armor, aviation, heavy artillery, and drones suggest a planned operation.” An Oct. 10 ceasefire, brokered by Russia, was short-lived. Fighting continues.

Fighting continues. “Most tragic of all are the casualties, whose numbers mount day by day, at this writing surpassing one hundred seventy of our people — soldiers and civilians alike, including women and children,” Findikyan said. “Most vulnerable to the attacks are villagers in outlying rural areas close to the borders; these desperate people have been especially targeted for shelling and sniper fire.”

Another response from Global Ministries has come in the form of a prayer posted Oct. 8 at its website (note: included in this edition of the *Spire*), composed by Peter Makari, area executive for the Middle East and Europe. “In this time of heightened tension, fighting, and destruction, we pray for calm, a cooling off, and a constructive effort, by those directly engaged, and by world

leaders, to bring about an end to fighting, a resolution of outstanding issues, and a commitment to peace with justice,” the prayer said.

“Walking with our partners in moments of conflict and crisis is incredibly important, and we know that the prayers of God people bring changes,” said the Rev. Karen Georgia Thompson, the UCC’s co-executive of Global Ministries. “We are one church, one body, and we hurt as the Armenian people and our Armenian partners hurt.”

(Note from Graham: The US State Department announced late on 10/25/20 that they have brokered a cease-fire while long-term peace negotiations continue. Please add to your prayers the continuing efforts of Secretary of State Pompeo to quell the region’s violence. At the date of this writing, more than 5000 people have been killed in the conflict.)

Prayer for peace in the Nagorno-Karabakh region

BY MIDDLE EAST & EUROPE - GLOBAL MINISTRIES ON OCTOBER 08, 2020

In the midst of the continuing escalation of conflict and violence in the Nagorno-Karabakh region, Global Ministries of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) and United Church of Christ offers this prayer for peace. We join the voices of ecumenical organizations and partners seeking an immediate end to the crisis.

Loving and merciful God, we come to you today with prayers for peace and for a cessation of violent conflict. We watch with pain as hundreds of people have already been killed, victims in renewed fighting in the Nagorno-Karabakh region, between Armenia and Azerbaijan. And we are concerned that fighting will escalate, drawing in other powers that would only cause immeasurable suffering for innocent people.

Caring Christ, Prince of Peace, just as you walk with us in our times of joy and tribulation, we walk with partners around the world, including our Armenian brothers and sisters, who are deeply concerned about their neighbors, the people of Artsakh – many of whom are Armenian by heritage themselves – as they seek to assert their own sovereignty where they can pursue a life of freedom and prosperity. We hear the cries of our Armenian partners, who know intimately the pain and suffering of the atrocity of war, and we heed their call for an end to Azeri aggression.

Holy Spirit, Breath of Life, we come to you with our fervent petition that leaders – especially those who have chosen war, injury, and death over justice and peace, healing, and life – come to see that the ways of self-interest and zero-sum conquest only result in the violation of the sanctity of life; and that they may choose a better way: one of mutual edification, common interest, and recognition and acceptance that another’s security enables one’s own ability to thrive.

In this time of heightened tension, fighting, and destruction, we pray for calm, a cooling off, and a constructive effort, by those directly engaged, and by world leaders, to bring about an end to fighting, a resolution of outstanding issues, and a commitment to peace with justice. We know that it is the most vulnerable who suffer the worst in times of war, and we know that your heart, o God, is in pain for them. We seek healing: of people, of peoples, and of nations, and that you, o God, can open hearts and minds.

For all of this we fervently pray, Amen.
