From the Pastor

Greetings, Friends in Christ --

For the last few months I have been preaching sermon series instead of the texts suggested by the three-year lectionary cycle. I first started with a series on the intersection of faith, money, and personality. Then I spent a month on the words we use (such as "atonement" and "salvation") to describe the effect on us of God's grace working through Christ Jesus. In the last sermon series, I looked at five poets, exploring how their poetry intersects the lessons of scripture and can help build our faith.

Sermon series seem to be working well in this time of pandemic and I have been encouraged by a number of folks to continue preaching in that vein. In light of that, I thought I would take a deeper look at the three most popular scripture verses, examining one verse per week. In order to find out what the most popular verses are, I performed an internet search, of course. The Google search results didn't all agree, but every source I looked at had these



three verses somewhere around the top:

1) For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but have eternal life. -- John 3:16

2) Seek first the Kingdom of God and its righteousness, and all these things will be added to you as well. -- Matthew 6:33

3) We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose. -- Romans 8:38

For the next three weeks (October 4, 11, and 18), we will look at one of these verses per week. Then, on October 25th, we'll commemorate our theological heritage with a Reformation Sunday worship celebration. On November 1 we will celebrate with thanksgiving faithful women and men who have gone before during our All Saints Day worship celebration.

<u>Christian Education</u> (submitted by Lani Bortfeld & Pastor Graham)

The church school had a great celebration on September 9th at Connor's Place, planned by Pastor Graham and the Board of Christian Education. Pastor Graham welcomed us and said grace over our picnic suppers. Then he presented the faith banners the children made which are now hanging in the sanctuary, made by Shirley Bracken and her grandchildren Kyle, Ava & Calin, Teddy & Sarah Flynn, Charlotte Hight, Paige McGuire, Lauren Richards and Maya Stefanik Then he gave each child present a pair of Christian bookmarks and presented mustard-seed bracelets which Marj Butler found for Paige McGuire with the attendance award, and Maya with the award for bringing her Bible and class materials. Teachers received thank-you gifts, and helpers received certificates. The Board then presented our pastor with a thank-you gift for his steadfast commitment to teaching children, youth and adults about the love and life of Jesus Christ. Graham led us in a family devotional, Lani passed around some of the new materials in our *Shine* curriculum this year and talked about the upcoming series of Bible stories for the fall on the patriarchs/matriarchs in Genesis. Families were especially enthusiastic about the *All of Us* Bible story book. Each family who registers their children for church school this year will receive a free copy of this updated Bible resource. It has more ethnic diversity in its illustrations, a modern translation of the Bible story first, and then a synopsis illustrated in graphic novel style on the next pages. Graham closed us with a prayer, and then it was time for ice cream on a stick and enjoying the park.

We are asking families to **please fill out a 2020-21 registration form and return to the church office or the church school teacher for that day** for each child attending, to update us on vital



information about your child or teen. Forms have been emailed to all families. We are continuing to hold church school at the Mill Pond park when weather permits. Families are asked to bring the usual items when we meet at Mill Pond Park: your church school bag with your Bible or children's Bible, folding chair, and mask. Please speak with your child/ren about our intention to keep them safe and instruct them to follow the guidance of our Sunday school teachers and adult chaperones. Thanks to Jason Stefanik and Pam Stevenson for helping out in September. Once the weather turns cold, we will return to Zoom.

In addition to the *All of Us* book, we have new maps, family trees, crafts, activities, music, magazines, Bible posters and other supplements to reach children with a variety of learning styles. Since teachers have to bring supplies to the park, we ask that families please let us know when you're going to be absent or bring a guest. Also, let us know when you can help reading the Bible story or lead a craft. Currently, Marj and Lani are the only teachers, so we really would appreciate any kind of help. We would especially love to train some new teachers to lighten the load on these two women. Teachers should be a member of the church and enjoy working with children or youth – contact a member of the Board or the church office to let us know what age group you prefer. For the winter Zoom church school, you do not have to host the session, just present the lesson; Lani or Graham will take care of the Zoom details.

Despite the fact that we aren't teaching in the CE classrooms downstairs, we are still using these rooms to store curriculum items. **PLEASE DO NOT drop off any items without asking a member of the CE Board first.** We don't want to sort through items that clutter up the rooms. Shirley Bracken donated a de-humidifier to keep our materials from getting musty – thank you, Shirley!

The board continues to check in with families by phone after each CE meeting to update you on upcoming events and catch up with your family's joys and concerns. Each family has a CE contact person; please let us know suggestions, questions, concerns or prayer requests. Your Board of CE wants to hear from and pray for you in these challenging times. In this way, we hope that we can stay connected in Christ through these tumultuous times.

Bible Study

Two sessions are offered each week: Wednesday and Thursday mornings beginning at 9:30 AM and running until 11-11:15. The study content is the same both mornings; however, on Wednesdays we remain socially distanced in the social hall without wearing facemasks. Masks are worn during the Thursday class. The studies are open to all; you are welcome on either morning for the situation you find most comfortable for yourself – or come to both!

2nd Miles Missions

Trick or Treat for UNICEF is a fundraising program started in 1949 in a Philadelphia, PA Presbyterian congregation. The first UNICEF collection gathered by kids that Halloween totaled \$17. Since then then the tradition of raising money for UNICEF spread, and since that time both children and adults around the country (and now in some other countries) have participated in this October fundraiser, raising about \$200,000,000 so far.

UNICEF provides aid for children and families around the world. UNICEF's activities include immunizations and disease prevention, administering treatment for children and mothers with HIV, enhancing childhood and maternal nutrition, improving sanitation, promoting education, and providing emergency relief in response to disasters.

This month our Missions Outreach Board is sending Trick or Treat for UNICEF boxes home to all members and friends of the church. We encourage you to put some change in your box every day for the month of October. Since we probably won't be experiencing trick or treating for Halloween in the same



manner we normally do, we also invite you to contribute the money you would normally spend on Halloween candy to UNICEF instead. We will dedicate the returned Trick or Treat for UNICEF in worship on November 8th.

During September, we were able to make 2 loans bringing our total loans to 169. The first loan went to Luis Antonio from El Salvador. He will use his loan to purchase fertilizers and herbicides for his crop of beans. The second loan went to Kadijatu, a refugee from Sierra Leone who lives in Arizona. She will use her loan to overcome the challenges in her business posed by the Covid-19 crisis. Their stories can be found in the KIVA notebook.

One loan was repaid in full during September. Peekapak used their loan to reach young children learn to cope and thrive after being victims of violence or bullying.

Roast Pork Wrap-Up

A lot of people enjoyed the meal and special thanks this month to Nick Wood for seasoning and cooking the pork and to Sam Pinney at Irish Bend Farm for donating the peaches for our dessert. We put up a record 262 dinners (some were given free as a thanks – and believe it or not, there were 4 no shows). Income was \$3,189.00 less expenses. There were some monetary donations and tips made before and during the dinner from patrons which were gratefully accepted.



Note: It is our Mission Outreach Board's tradition to have two second mile mission fundraisers – UNICEF Trick or Treat for Children and Neighbors in Need (NIN), an offering of the United Church of Christ focusing on ministries of compassionate witness here in the United States. Because of the pandemic, we have simplified our offering schedule this year. We will collect in October for UNICEF alone (please find another article about our UNICEF collection within this newsletter.) However, our Missions Outreach Board is committed to donating to Neighbors in Need on behalf of the congregation from our elective disbursements.

Following is an example of a ministry funded by Neighbors in Need here in Connecticut.

In Hartford: Faces of Homelessness

Hands on Hartford is a long-time NIN grant recipient. The Connecticut organization, founded more than 50 years ago by City Center churches, uses your gifts to support The Faces of Homelessness Speakers' Bureau. People with former or current homelessness experience share their stories with the public to raise awareness about homelessness, hunger, and other poverty issues in a very personal way. The speakers develop leadership skills and stability in their own lives as they help inspire action toward economic justice. "We would have struggled to develop this program without the help of Neighbors in Need," said Janet Jones Bann, grants manager, Hands on



Hartford.

"The grants have really allowed us to run Faces of Homelessness. It's had a huge impact -- on thousands of people who heard their powerful stories and on dozens of formerly homeless folks who have realized stability in their own lives," said Barbara Shaw,

the organization's executive director. She referenced single mothers who have overcome challenges of being homeless with children and one individual who lived outdoors for years, now housed and participating.

The program employs a formerly homeless person as part-time project co-coordinator and currently has seven active speakers who share their stories at schools, colleges, local employers, and with faith communities.

"I think this is something churches have struggled with – how to get a balance of directly serving people in need as we make a difference in this world with social justice, with people advocating for themselves," Shaw said. "Faith-based basic support services and the compassion are important, but we can also help people find their voice in the world. And create change in this world. This program does that. It also does more for the speakers individually that we have ever imagined."

Audiences grateful for stories

In the last four years, Faces of Homelessness has racked up 131 presentations and raised awareness significantly. In follow-up surveys collected by the bureau:

• 98 percent reported that they have a better understanding of the realities of homelessness.

- 92 percent said they feel more motivated to get involved.
- 98 percent felt the presentation met expectations and raised awareness.
- 90 percent said they have a better understanding of how to get involved following an event.

While the pandemic forced HOH to initially curtail speaking engagements and stopped the recruitment of new speakers, the bureau has "started doing virtual events, which was not in their repertoire earlier," Shaw said. "We've done a number them, have a couple in the planning stage and are just now letting folks know." Annie Wendel, assistant director in the Office of Volunteer Programs and Service Learning at Connecticut's Sacred Heart University, lauded a recent online presentation. In a thank-you to Faces of Homelessness'



Anne Goshdigian in August, she wrote, "You should know that when the students logged back in for evening reflection, they were so grateful that you and Andrea shared your stories with them. It was a great way to help frame the important social justice work that they are engaging

in this week (and beyond). I will keep Hands On Hartford in mind for future volunteer opportunities and will *definitely* be reaching out again to schedule a speaker for next year's program (hopefully by that time it will be in person!)."
