Every year, in the United States and in the rest of the world, people are the victims of natural disasters. In 2021, once again there were natural disasters all over the world. An earthquake in Haiti, a typhoon in the Philippines, flooding in Germany, and many more. Here in the United States, there was a severe winter storm in Texas, wildfires in the West, a hurricane in Louisiana, and tornadoes in Kentucky. All these disasters often leave the victims with only the clothes on their backs. Can you imagine not having a way of washing, brushing your teeth, combing your hair or covering a wound, often for a long period of time? From the Pastor

Greetings, Friends in Christ -

Lately I have been mulling over possible topics for the next preaching series. The current series on names and titles for our triune God will wrap up on February 6. Ash Wednesday, which marks the beginning of Lent, falls on March 2. That leave us three Sundays (Feb. 13, 20, and 27) between the conclusion of this preaching series and the start of Lent.

I am 95% sure I have discerned that I want to talk about money. I know that I've preached some sermons here and there about money but devoting three weeks in a row to the topic will afford us a richer understanding. Presently I think I will examine our relationship with money from three perspectives, one per week: 1) from the point of view of Christian theology, 2) from the point of view of Christian ethics, and 3) from the point of view of our Christian scriptures. Of course, each of these perspectives will overlap. One informs the other and I hope that the sermons will build one upon the other.

Because I expect the sermons will build upon each other, I especially encourage you to come each of those three Sundays. Of course, if you can't make one of the Sundays, the services are archived on live.somersvilleucc.org so you can still keep in the loop.

Do you have any particular questions about a Christian's relationship to money? Shoot me an email or pull me aside at church. I might be able to work your question into one of the sermons.

Our scriptures, ethics, and theology have <u>a lot</u> to say on this topic. So let us not be silent on it. Join us!

Stewardship Update (submitted by Deb Roubidoux)

Did you know that United Church of Christ churches like ours are fully self supporting through our own contributions? We are unlike some larger denominations that have dioceses or presbyteries which funnel money from the wider church down to the smaller local churches. In the United Church of Christ, we do just the opposite. We contribute a couple of dollars per member to support the Southern New England Conference and the national UCC. We the members, through our pledges and tithes, pay the salaries of the pastor and staff, pay for fuel and building maintenance, and cover all the other costs of running the local church. So when you are here on Sunday morning you can look to your left and to your right, to the person in front of you and behind you, and know that those folks, along with you, are keeping our precious church running and thriving.

We are especially blessed to have some members who pledge very generously. Thanks to their gifts, the average member need only pledge a little less than \$3000 per year to support the entire yearly budget. That's around the same as what many pay for cable TV each month! The blessings we receive in return for these small gifts are lasting and invaluable.

For the 2022 calendar year we have received 29 pledges totaling \$65,664. We would like to extend our deepest thanks to those who pledged. Unfortunately, that pledge amount only covers about half of our annual budget. Many fewer people pledged this year than in years past. We know these are uncertain times. But it is times like these when we rely most heavily on our faith and on our church family. Many of us have been members here for decades. Our children grew up here. Maybe we or our children got married or baptized here. Some have only been members for weeks or months, yet we receive grace upon grace each time we join together in community.

It was pointed out to the Stewardship committee that the amount received in pledges last year, along with the amount received for the capital campaign, was roughly equivalent to the 2022 budget. If folks were able to



give what they did last year and still meet their personal financial obligations, we ask that you would consider giving the same amount this year. Or if you have never Stewardship pledged, maybe take a leap of faith and make a financial commitment to the

church. Each of us are members of the body of Christ. Our gifts of time, talent and tithe matter to each other, and to the Lord our God.

We've received a note from the team at St. Pauly Textile (our clothing shed company in the parking lot by the green) sharing news that over 40 million pounds of clothing were donated in their sheds during 2021. Our shed provided 32,665 pounds!! This was enough to clothe about 6,017 people all over the world and earned us \$1,307.
